## **Update on traffic**

Wiltshire Council, responsible for highways, has now said that any one-way system for traffic in Bradford must maintain Silver Street as two-way for buses. Last autumn the whole town council agreed a motion asking Wiltshire Council to introduce a new traffic system with wider pavements in the town centre. The response from Wiltshire Council, in a briefing note issued just before Christmas, also said a detailed technical study will be needed to investigate the viability of a bus contraflow system, without which one-way will not be acceptable. The town council has asked Wiltshire Council to proceed with this study.

Sam Blackwell says, "Traffic is a thorny topic in Bradford on Avon, and safety of pedestrians has been our top priority throughout our negotiations with Wiltshire Council. Ten years after the vote rejecting the historic core zone for Bradford, the town council has succeeded in bringing Wiltshire Council back to the table. Repeated changes of Cabinet member for Highways over the past four years haven't made it easy, but we have kept them engaged. If elected to Wiltshire Council, I will continue the work to get the best deal we can for our town."

#### **Progress on a new pedestrian bridge**

Last year, the town council sent Wiltshire Council the strategic outline case for a new pedestrian bridge. Wiltshire Council has now responded offering engineering and bid support to help the project progress and secure funding. Local MP Brian Mathew has written to Wiltshire Council offering to help progress the project. Katie Vigar says, "It's great that the town council has secured this support from Wiltshire Council and from our MP. As well as making crossing the river safer, a new bridge should help keep the town connected at times of flooding."

# Walker runs for council

**New to the team, James Atkinson is a keen walker and standing for election to the town council.** He says, **"The walking wheel map was the best £5 I ever spent."** As well as using our local footpath network, James is keen to help our town become safer for all users of our roads and pavements.

He says, "As a pedestrian, I tend to notice all the little things around the town from minor issues such as uneven paving slabs and dog waste to major hazards such as finding a way to cross the top of Market Street to Newtown and the town bridge safely on foot.

"As I see it, lots of issues intersect: air quality, traffic speed, pavement parking and obstructions such as untrimmed hedges and dog fouling which combine to make the experience of walking through the town a difficult and sometimes dangerous one. If elected to the town council, this is something I'd be keen to work on."
