When are the elections?

Thursday 1st May.

What are we voting for?

Wiltshire Council and BoA Town Council. Bradford South Ward has one Wiltshire Councillor and six town councillors.

How do I vote?

Who runs the councils at the moment? Wiltshire Council is Conservative run with the Liberal Democrats the largest opposition group. Bradford's current two Wiltshire Councillors are Lib Dem. The current town council is formed of seven Liberal Democrat councillors and five Ideal Bradford councillors.

What do the councils do?

Lots of things that affect our daily lives! Wiltshire Council is responsible for social services for adults and children, roads and pavements, rubbish collection and recycling, planning, housing, special educational needs provision, transport, libraries and more. The town council is responsible for our play areas, parks and other green spaces, buildings such as St Margaret's Hall, the youth centre and public toilets. Its role includes the youth service, events, encouraging tourism and allocating grants.

Update on traffic

Wiltshire Council, responsible for highways, has now said that any one-way system for traffic in Bradford must maintain Silver Street as two-way for buses. Last autumn the whole town council agreed a motion asking Wiltshire Council to introduce a new traffic system with wider pavements in the town centre. The response from Wiltshire Council, in a briefing note issued just before Christmas, also said a detailed technical study will be needed to investigate the viability of a bus contraflow system, without which one-way will not be acceptable. The town council has asked Wiltshire Council to proceed with this study.

Jack Vittles says, "Traffic is a decades-old problem in Bradford on Avon, and the safety of pedestrians has been our top priority throughout our discussions with Wiltshire Council - who are the highways authority. Following the town's past decisions not to go ahead with an historic core zone, we have now succeeded in bringing Wiltshire Council back to the table. Repeated changes of Cabinet member for Highways at Wiltshire Council haven't made it easy, but we have kept them engaged. If re-elected to the Town Council, I will work tirelessly to get the best deal for our town."

Progress on a new pedestrian bridge

Last year, the town council sent Wiltshire Council the strategic outline case for a new pedestrian bridge. Wiltshire Council has now responded offering engineering and bid support to help the project progress and secure funding. Local MP Brian Mathew has written to Wiltshire Council offering to help progress the project. Ben Reed says, "It's good news that the town council has won this support from Wiltshire Council and our MP. A new bridge will make it safer to cross the river and help keep the town connected when it floods."
